Follow Freda's footsteps......



Always keep your dog in sight and use a lead if you don't have a reliable recall.

Pick up after your dog wherever you are, unless signs say you don't need to.

Prevent your dog from approaching other people, dogs, cyclists or horse riders, unless it's OK by them.

Follow these simple rules and your dog will always be welcome


Prevent your dog from approaching, chasing or flushing out any wildlife or farm animals.



Follow requests to keep all dogs on a lead, at certain times and places, for wildlife and nearby childrens' play areas.

Cannock Chase was designated an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) in 1958 because of its beautiful landscape, wildlife and history. This means the 26 square mile area is protected by law and managed to maintain its special character for now and in the future.

Cannock Chase has the largest surviving area of lowland heathland in the Midlands, which is an internationally scarce and threatened habitat. It also has extensive areas of forest, woodland and parkland.
