



Poets from all cultures have found ideas for their work from being out in nature. Why not see if you can find some nature poetry to read? Poems can be long, short, serious or silly! Take a walk in the beautiful wilderness of Cannock Chase and gather some ideas for poems of your own.

Write a haiku

One very short type of poem is a haiku. This is a type of poem from Japan. It has seventeen syllables: 5 in the first line, 7 in the next line and 5 in the last line.

What is a syllable? It's a bit like the beat of a drum. If your name is Tom, your name has one syllable. If your name is Benjamin, it has three syllables: Ben-jamin. If your name is Elizabeth, your name has four syllables: E-li-za-beth. How many syllables does your name have?

Write an acrostic poem

Another fun type of poem to try writing is called an acrostic poem. Here, the first letters of a word start each line of your poem.



This is an acrostic using the word "HEATHLAND." Heathland is a very rare habitat. Cannock Chase has the largest area of Heathland in the Midlands and it is a protected landscape, because it is so precious.

Write free poetry
